Explore heritage homes and sites

Saint Andrews is a history buff's dream. You can get a glimpse of our past on nearly every street corner. There's a wealth of heritage homes, churches, buildings and five (!) National Historic Sites. Cross the ocean floor to Ministers Island

When the tide is low, you can enjoy the unique experience of getting to Ministers Island by walking, driving or cycling on sand that would have been completely submerged just hours earlier. Once you arrive, you're in for a real treat. The island was once home to Sir William Van Horne, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Get whisked back in time by taking a guided tour of the mansion and don't miss the collection of antique automobiles housed in the grandiose stables. The last day to visit the island this season is Sunday, October 19, 2025.

Tee off at the Algonquin Golf Course

Take your game to the next level by playing one of the most picturesque seaside golf courses you could ever imagine. Established over a century ago, the Algonquin Golf Course has been carefully reworked over the years to ensure it remains a top golfing destination. Most recently, the course was recreated under the guidance of Rod Whitman, one of Canada's most celebrated designers. The proof? Every one of Whitman's designs is in the Top 100 in Canada on SCOREGolf's biennial course ranking. The golf course closes for the season on November 2, 2025.





Walk or cycle the Van Horne Trail

Located in the heart of Saint Andrews, the Van Horne Trail is an 8.4 km loop that's bursting with beautiful scenery, especially when the foliage changes. Enter the trail from Water Street, and you can take in the lush forest, views of Pagan Point, the beach at Katy's Cove and (on a clear day) the bath house and mansion on Ministers Island. The eight-foot wide trail is very well-maintained and provides a dog-friendly, easy route that's accessible to hikers, cyclists, wheelchairs and strollers.

Lap up the charm of Water Street

Lined with boutiques, art galleries, cafes, bars and restaurants, Water Street is the main thoroughfare in town. It's the best way to enjoy the warm embrace of East Coast living. But make no mistake - there's nothing artificially manufactured to be seen anywhere along the street. Authentic small-town charm exudes on every corner, where friendly locals always make you feel right at home.





Hang with the locals

You'll definitely want to chill with these good-natured folks over an ice-cold beer or a fancy cocktail/mocktail at one of the many fine establishments peppered throughout the town. No matter where you hail from, they'll welcome you as one of their own in no time. (After all, a lot of them are "from away" too.) And the best part is you'll meet an array of characters whose backgrounds and vocations are as unique as the venues themselves.

The horror, the horror!

Who doesn't love a good ghost story? Aside from the deceased themselves, that is. If you dare, you can meet outside the old gaol (Celtic for jail) for a spooky ghost tour and walk through the local cemeteries. You'll hear some interesting and spine-tingling stories about local criminals and other shady characters at the gaol that was still in operation in the 1970s. And what better way to keep history alive than raising the dead? *Tours operate until the end of October, weather permitting*.





Must-see sea life

What's a visit to a coastal town without meeting some of its undersea inhabitants? At the Huntsman Marine Science Centre, you'll discover the wonders of local marine life through interactive exhibits and shows. And you can get some hands-on experience with fascinating sea dwellers at the touch aquarium that's popular with amateur marine biologists young and old. The Huntsman closes for the season on October 13, 2025.

Live! From Saint Andrews

For most music aficionados, there's nothing quite like enjoying it up close and personal. You can get your fill of live music performed by talented local artists at many of the restaurants, cafes, pubs and bars around town. Sing along, dance up a storm or just sit back and enjoy the vibes.
